## From the Rector

Lent is a wonderful time to catch our breath.

Other seasons of the church year have been at least partially hijacked by the culture around us. But not Lent. There's just not the same chorus of competing voices around us saying "We can show you how to spend more money getting ready for Lent!" let alone "We can show you how to give up more things so that you and all the world can live more simply!"

So here are some of the ways some of us are using to make the most of Lent.



"Giving up something" for Lent is a wonderful spiritual discipline. What we give up should be something which we can have less of for a while without doing harm. Foregoing some mild luxury or non-essential thing item six days a week is a small but effective way of making us more aware of the abundance which God pours out upon us, just a little more aware of our opportunity to make positive choices.

Adding one intentional time for prayer is another gift we can give ourselves in Lent. The *Book of Common Prayer* gives a simple form of prayer for individuals and families for four specific times of day: one page each for the morning, midday, late afternoon and bedtime. Why not pick one of these times to pause briefly and be in conversation with God? Copies of a sheet with all four are available at Church. They can also be found on pages 137-140 of the Prayerbook and can be downloaded at [www.justus.anglican.org/resources/bcp/formatted\\_1979.htm](http://www.justus.anglican.org/resources/bcp/formatted_1979.htm) (download the section beginning at page 137 in your preferred format).

Daily Scripture reading is another gift we can give ourselves in Lent. Various resources are available at Church. Prayer book readings for each week can be found

In addition, Scripture tells us that God's first gift to us was the Sabbath. "On the seventh day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation." (Geneses 2:2). We've been meeting on Thursday evenings for a soup, bread and conversation about "Sabbath Time". Why are we always out of time? In a world that lives 24/7, what would it be like to go back to living 24/6? How can the idea and practice of Sabbath-ness find a place again our lives? How can serving God help save the planet?

Finally, we're meeting on Fridays in the Church at 8:30 a.m. for Intercessory Prayers and at 5:00 p.m. for Stations of the Cross

May we all have a blessed Lent.

Special Sunday or not, the Altar Guild is always hard at work. Jennifer, Carla and Donna keep things orderly.

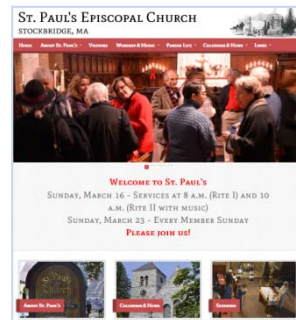
Every Member Sunday was a big success with a great turnout, wonderful food, and terrific fellowship. We hope to have more days like this!

### **Will you be coming to St. Paul's?**

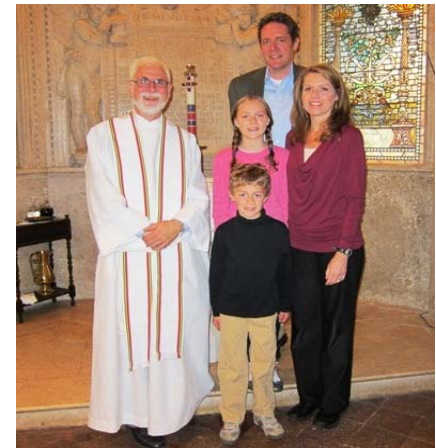
Next came a short conversation about St. Paul's being like a family and Quinn decided he would be coming to St. Paul's. He definitely like being part of the St. Paul's family!
